- 41.) Problem of war. - Not produced by aggressiveness - But purposeful action / job - (like exploitation) was human involvement. Killings, famulus does not mean pleasure in killing people. (w. too kill flies)
Sadistic pleasure typically human!
- 42.) Body contact of peck, lactation of small importance for attachment & m. (m) visual & ol. close to m., not & f.
- 43.) Principle: mind of later go. others not repetition, but drawing one of the few possibilities of adult go.
- 44.) "... With one notable exception the phylogenetic course of behavioral development has been gradual, proceeding by quantitative rather than by qualitative changes. The one exception is that our species makes the transition from the typical nonhuman primates to man ... At this point a new dimension 'or mode' of development emerges: culture." (Henry V.
