Fromm was one of the most influential neo-Freudian analysts who, like Freud, was greatly influenced by Karl Marx, Martin Buber, Christian and Zen Buddhist thinking, and Jewish mysticism. He departed from Freud's instinct theories and sought to give psychoanalysis a social and cultural orientation. Best known for studies on the psychological basis of Nazism (*Escape from Freedom*), the nature of human loving, and the dangers of human destructiveness. Dipl: Am. Psych. Assn.
