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Statistical Tests: Nonparametric

Introduction

The statistical analysis of the data in this study was based on the nonparametric statistical procedures of Professor Sidney Siegel. Classical or parametric tests were not relevant for this research primarily because the data was ranked (ordinal) and not measured by anything as strong as an interval scale. Siegel comments as follows:

At the risk of being excessively repetitious, the writer wishes to emphasize here that parametric statistical tests, which use means and standard deviations (i.e., which require the operations of arithmetic on the original scores), ought not to be used with data in an ordinal scale. The properties of an ordinal scale are .not isomorphic to the numerical system known as arithmetic. When only the rank order of scores is known, means and standard deviations found on the scores themselves are in error to the extent that the successive intervals (distances between classes) on the scale are not equal. When parametric techniques of statistical inference are used with such data, any decisions about hypotheses are doubtful. Probability statements derived from the application of parametric statistical tests to ordinal data are in error to the extent that the structure of the method of collecting the data is not isomorphic to arithmetic. Inasmuch as most of the measurements made by behavioral scientists culminate in ordinal scales . . . this point deserves strong emphasis.1

The rationals for the use of nonparametric statistical pro-

cedures are summarized as follows;

1. Tests used are "distribution free," one of their primary merits being that they do not assume that the scores under analysis were drawn from a population distribution in a certain way, e.g., from a normally distributed population.

2. Scaparametric techniques may be used with scores which are not exact in any numerical sense, but which in effect are simply ranks.

3. A third advantage of these techniques . . . is their computational simplicity.

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4. A final advantage of nonparametric tests is their usefulmess with small samples.1

The two tests used were (1) the <u>Mann-Whitney U Test</u> to test for significant differences -- "one of the most powerful of the nonparametric tests . . . a most useful alternative to the parametric \underline{t} test, ² and (2) the <u>Kendall Rank Correlation</u> (<u>Tau</u>) for two way and partial coordination: two way correlation for reliability and validity and the partial correlation for testing relationships between Riesman, Fromm, and Morris.

It should be noted that the Average of Bank (expected values) in this study, using nonparametric statistics, is "comparable" to the mean of parametric statistics. Averages of Bank were calculated during the same computer run that generated histograms. <u>These Averages</u> of Bank "expected values" (see Table 1) were used only to demonstrate a general picture of response for each question; they were not used in any other way nor with any other statistical calculations. The histograms revealed many bi-model distributions within each occupational entegory, that is, for one question there were few ranks in the middle. Most tended to be on each tail.

All data in the study was programmed for FORTRAN use with the THM # 360/40 computer. Tables of data show significance at two levels: (1) P = .05 as <u>significant</u>; (2) P = .01 as <u>very significant</u>.²

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Mann-Whitney U Test

<u>The Mann-Whitney U Test</u> with P = .05 (1 tail) was used to test whether the independent groups of occupational categories (Bank Presidents, Advertising Agency Presidents, Certified Public Accountants) were from the same population.

Since the quantities of data were large (<u>Response totals</u>: 163 from bank presidents, large bank; 171 from bank presidents, small bank; 215 from Certified Public Accountants; 117 from advertising agency presidents), the U distribution approached the normal distribution. The Z test was used to test for significant differences in the occupational categories.

Ties were avoided by appending a <u>random number</u> to each of the ranks as it was read into the computer. For example, if respondents ranked 6 on a particular question, then each may have appeared internally to the computer as 6.006791 and 6.004312. This procedure broke ties within groups and between groups. It also had the negligible effect of increasing variance by .01 per cent. Statistically, the use of random numbers provided a finer division of data to 10^{-7} , which agrees with the principle of underlying continuity of the distribution. Ranking of opinions, attitudes, et cetera, is theoretically continuous. Thus, a division of the ranked data to eight places better approximates the real world.

Comparisons of data--bank president, small bank, advertising agency president, and Certified Public Accountant--were made against the bank president, large bank, when the Mann-Whitney U Test

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statistics were calculated. Thus, the minus sign (-) behind a number in the tables indicates a position to the left of the bank president. large bank. For example, Question 5 indicates that the bank president small bank, is to the left of the bank president, large bank, data: bence, bank presidents, small banks, are slightly less inner-directed as revealed by Question 5 than are bank presidents, large banks.

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Kendall Rank Correlation (Tau)

The Kendall Rank Correlation (Tau) with P = .05 (2-tail) was used to obtain correlation coefficients, two-way and partial.

The two-way test was used to test for reliability and validity. The two-tailed test was used to test for general agreement, not "more" agreement from one question to another.

The <u>partial correlation test</u> (partial Tau) was used to test the three authors--Riesman, Fromm, and Morris--with one another, that is, to see the possible three-dimensional empirical relationships as hypothesized earlier. At present and to the author's knowledge, there is no entirely adequate way to test for confidence on partial correlation coefficients.

There is also no adequate comparison between a nonparametric Tau and a parametric \underline{r} . Thus, small values of Tau do not mean the same low correlation as do small values of parametric \underline{r} . Since significence is a function of sample size, very large samples (that is, over 100) tend to yield significance with relatively low values of Tau. However, because of the large percentage of ties, the low valued Tau's may not be quite as significant as indicated in the reliability and validity calculations.¹

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Reliability and Validity

Introduction

With respect to <u>reliability</u>, the <u>pairing of questions</u> technique was used. Ferguson, in citing several methods of testing reliability, comments on the "parallel forms" method: "Parallel or equivalent forms of a test may be administered to the same group of subjects, and the paired observations correlated. Criteria of parallelism are required."

Econever, it should be restated here that <u>the primary focus in</u> <u>this study is on the Riesman inner-other-directed social character</u> typology with criteria provided by Brodbeck.

Pairing in the sociological dimension of Riesman was conceptually possible in more adequate terms than the possibility of "paired criteria" in the social psychological dimension of Fromm's marketing and hoarding oriented social character and the philosophical (value) dimension of Charles Morris' Ways to Live. The complexity of the two latter dimensions, that of Fromm and Morris, introduces empirical difficulties in the attempt to link Riesman with Fromm, Riesman with Morris and Fromm with Morris. Elaborations on these difficulties are noted under the reliability and validity data of the respective authors, Fromm and Morris.

The manner of calculating the reliability and validity

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coefficients is that which is appropriate to a survey in that it is <u>a-posteriori</u>, namely, the variables exist non-controlled and the study involves "<u>the situation as it exists</u>." However, the paired inner-other-directed statements in Parts IA and IIIA permitted statistical analysis for <u>consistency</u> with respect to each statement as a question.

<u>Beliability relates to consistency of answers over a period</u> of time. The time period involved is the time taken by each respondent to answer questions in Part IA, the time period to answer Part II and lastly, the time period to answer the questions in Part IIIA--an interval of approximately thirty minutes before completing Part IV on Demographic Data.

The validity of the test with respect to the questions and what they measure, i.e., inner-other-direction is based on the criteria provided as extracted by Brodbeck from <u>The Lonely Crowd</u>. In addition, Riesman's own comment on the reasonableness of these two occupational groups to represent his ideal types serve as guides, that is, Certified Public Accountants and advertising agency presidents, notwithstanding the observation of Riesman about the difficulty, if not impossibility, of operationalizing inner-otherdirectedness.

The use of From and Morris questions with respective qualifications relating to reliability and validity apply also.

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Reliability: Morris Ways to Live

The Morris Ways to Live questions covered three questionnaire pages in Part II. Since there was no actual "pairing" of questions, as was possible in the Riesman typology, a question was selected from the first page of the Ways to Live and correlated with a question from the third page of the Ways to Live. This was the procedure, then, to effect a pairing of a Part I and a Part III item and, within the context of the study with the major focus on Riesman, it was the "best" procedure to evaluate the "reliability" of Morris Ways to Live.

Two sets of "paired" questions were chosen, both relating to Fromm social character orientation, as hypothesized for the bank president, large and small bank.

> a. The <u>first "paired" set</u> related to Promm's <u>Hoarding Orien</u>tation:

Q. 29 - Way 1: "Preserve the best that man has attained"
Q. 38 - Way 10: "Control the self stoically"

This first "paired" set was tested on all four occupational categories.

b. The second "paired" set related to Fromm's Marketing
 Orientation:

Q. 32 - Way 4: "Experience festivity and solitude in alternation"

Q. 36 - Way 8: "Live with wholesome, carefree enjoyment"
 This set of "paired" questions was tested on bank presidents,
 large and small banks only.



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It should be noted also that because Hypothesis No. 8 relating Morris to From was tested using Questions No. 29 and No. 38 taken together and because they were "paired" for reliability, some auto-correlation effect may be present on the Mann-Whitney U Test for significance. Since the effect is in favor of the minimal,¹ the conclusions on this hypothesis were not altered.

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Beliability: Fromm Social Character Orientations

The procedure in obtaining "reliability" on Fromm's social character orientations was handled in a similar manner as that of Morris and for the same reasons:

Two sets of questions showing <u>significant differences</u> were selected as this was the first step in an attempt to "pair." However, general content of the "paired" items in the second instance or case precluded any comparison and thus possible correlation in the latter.

> A. <u>The first "paired" set</u> related to the <u>hearding orients-</u> <u>tion</u>, one question from Part IB and the other from Part IIIB in the questionnaire as in the case with the selection for the Riesman typology.
> Q. 17 - "I am ... CAREFUL" (Part IB)

Q. 64 - "I am ... METHODICAL" (Part IIIB)

This "paired" set was tested on all four occupational categories.

B. The <u>second "paired" set</u>--and paired only with respect to <u>significance</u> related to <u>the only two marketing oriented</u> <u>questions that showed significant differences</u>. The questions from Part IB and Part III were:
Q. 15 - "I am ... AELE TO CHARGE" (Part IB)
Q. 56 - "I am ... CURIOUS" (Part IIIB)
Since they could not be <u>paired in meaning</u>, no reliability or validity coefficients were computed for the marketing orientation.

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Validity

With respect to <u>validity</u>, <u>occupational pairings</u> were used based on the theoretical insights of Riesman as to <u>inner-directed</u> occupational social character, that is, <u>Certified Public Accountants</u> and <u>other-directed</u> occupational social character, that is, <u>advertising</u> <u>agency presidents</u>. Thus, <u>the hypothesized similarities for valida-</u> <u>tion</u> were as follows:

- Bank Presidents <u>Large Banks</u> Other-directed and validated on other-directed occupational group, <u>adver-</u> tising agency presidents.
- .b. Bank Presidents <u>Small Banks</u> Inner-directed and validated on inner-directed occupational group, <u>Certified</u> Public Accountants.

Validation coefficients on <u>all Riesman questions</u> were obtained from all four occupational categories: bank presidents, large bank; bank presidents, small bank; advertising agency presidents; Certified Public Accountants.

Validation coefficients on Fromm and Morris questions were obtained in a manner of "pairing" within the dimensional limitations noted earlier.

A Kendall Tau <u>partial correlation model</u> was constructed to see the relationships between Riesman, Fromm, and Morris. A representative question from each author was chosen for the correlation.

(a) <u>Riesman</u>. Question No. 9: "There is a sharp separation between work and pleasure" was chosen. It related to inner-direction. The Mann-Whitney U Test revealed that Question 9 shows bank presidents, small bank, to be slightly more inner-directed than bank presidents, large banks.

(b) Fromm. Question No. 17: "I an careful" was chosen. It related to the hoarding orientation. The Mann-Whitney U Test revealed that Question 17 shows bank presidents, small bank, to be more hoarding oriented than bank presidents, large banks.

(c) <u>Morris</u>. Question Ho. 38: Way to Live # 10 - "Control the self stoically" was chosen. It related to Fromm's hoarding orientation. The Mann-Whitney U Test revealed that Question 38 shows bank presidents, small bank, to be more "self controlled" (similarities in hoarding orientation) than were bank presidents, large banks.

Using bank presidents, <u>large bank</u>, responses, the three authors (Riesman, From and Morris) were compared. Holding 'constant' a different author on each computer run, three partial correlation coefficients were obtained. Thus, in order of descending magnitude:

(1) Bank president, large bank:

Tau Riesman Froms * Morris = .16 Tau Morris Froms* Riesman = .16



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Tau Riesman Morris * From = .14

In this case, using bank president, large bank data, all three authors contribute almost equally to the understanding of this study model of self-concept.

Using bank presidents, <u>small bank</u>, responses, the three authors were again compared. Again, holding 'constant' a different author on each computer run, three partial correlation coefficients were obtained. The following results are presented in order of descending magnitude.

(2) Bank president, small bank

Tau Morris From * Riegman = .20 Tau Riegman Morris * From = .10 Tau Riegman From * Morris = .03

In this case, using bank president, small bank data, Morris contributes the most to understanding self-concept, Fromm contributes some and Riesman contributes the least.

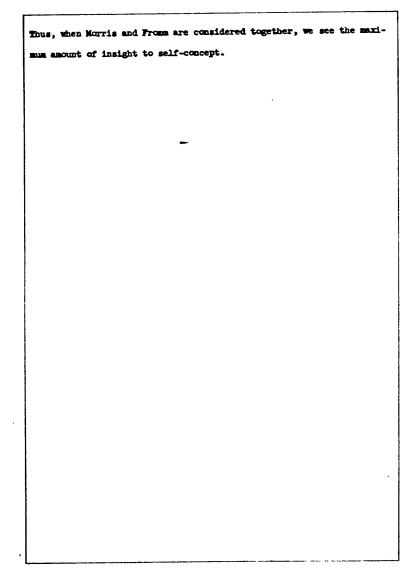
Also, the magnitude of the numbers of the Morris and Fromm Tau in the last case would be seven times that of the Riesman and Fromm Tau if it were positive (+) and two times that of the Riesman and Morris Tau. We cannot conclude that the Morris and Fromm Tau is seven times more powerful than the Riesman and Fromm Tau. But, the Morris Fromm Tau (.20) is higher than the Riesman Fromm Tau (-.03).

While no confidence test can be used on these partial Tau's, it is apparent from bank president, small bank data, based on relative magnitudes of the small bank partial Tau, that Morris and From contribute the most to the understanding of self-concept.

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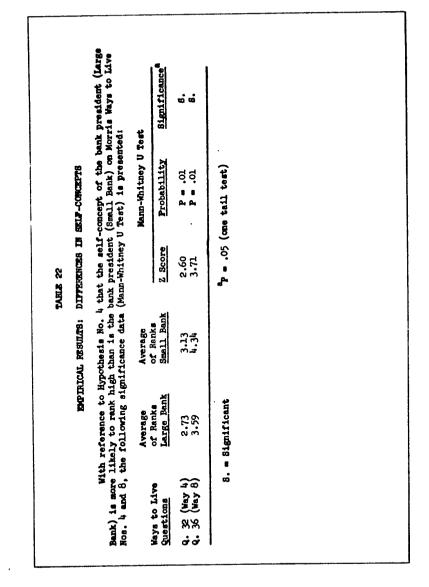

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CHAPTER V

DEMOGRAPHIC DATA SUDGARY

The limited occupational data that was sought in this study is presented in Table 27 showing the Average of Ranks for Demographic Data. Interpolating from the rank average, the following facts allow comparisons between the bank president in the <u>large and small bank</u> and three questions relating to Certified Public Accountants and advertising agency presidents. In questionnaire order, the facts are:

 Q. 70 relates to <u>age group</u>. a. Bank presidents, large bank = 55 yrs. b. Bank presidents, small bank = 51 yrs. c. Certified Public Accountants = 40 yrs. d. Advertising agency presidents = 50 yrs.
 Q. 71 relates to <u>education</u>. All groups are college graduates. The difference is in the degree granted. Bank presidents, large and small bank and advertising agency presidents indicate a background in the liberal arts/humanities. Certified Public Accountants specify a business administration degree, plus <u>some</u> graduate study.
 Q. 80¹ relates to gross income (1965) from salary and bonus, if any. a. Bank presidents, large bank = \$38,000 b. Bank presidents, small bank = \$15,000 c. Certified Public Accountants = \$14,000 d. Advertising agency presidents = \$34,000

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CONCLUSIONS

This empirical research was undertaken to study the ideal types of David Riesman's inner-other-directed social character. This typology provided the basic sociological dimension within which to view self-concept. The earlier typological contributions of Erich Fromm and Charles Norris to Riesman's own formulation of social character were included in the study by way of expanding the frame of reference for self-concept, thus incorporating the socialpsychological and philosophical or value dimensions. The rationale for such a procedure was based on the stated secondary objective, namely, to obtain a richer interdisciplinary perspective with subsequent greater elaboration in specifying self-concept with sample subjects.

The study probed for relationships between Riesman's ideal types of social character and two of Fromm's ideal type orientations, the boarding and marketing orientation.

In addition, further typological exploration related to the elaboration of self-concept with Riesman's and Fromm's social character types and the value orientations of Morris' <u>Mays to Live</u>.

A self-concept questionnaire was sent to a national sample of subjects, two groups of bank presidents: large banks and small banks. Data was obtained with which to evaluate and verify the hypothesized contributions of Riesman, Fromm, and Morris. The questionnaire response from bank presidents, both groups, amounted to 43.5 per cent

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of the total sample.

Using the identical self-concept questionnaire, two additional groups of mature men were selected on a national sample basis for the validation and reliability data on the Riesman inner-other-directed social character types. Specifically, Certified Public Accountants were used representing other-direction. Thirty-eight per cent of the Certified Public Accountants and thirty-six per cent of the advertising agency presidents responded to the questionnaire request for data.

Nonparametric statistical tests, the Mann-Whitney U Test and the Kendall Rank Correlation (Tau), were used to analyze the data. A partial correlation model using Riesman, Fromm and Morris was constructed to test the three authors' theoretical contributions with one another. In addition, all questions--a total of 69 subsumed under eight hypotheses--relating to Riesman, Fromm and Morris were tested individually for significance. It should be noted that these three typological contributions to self-concept insight should be interpreted in terms of nonparametric statistical language (Mann-Whitney U Test), that is, each significant question refers to rankings of "more" or "less" with respect to the hypothesized typologies (stated in terms of more); hence, the empirical findings in this study are as follows:

With respect to Hypothesis # 1 relating to Riesman's otherdirected social character, the null hypothesis is accepted. However, three of the ten questions showed significant differences: questions 6, 43, and 49; thus, the bank president, small bank, ranks more



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(higher) than the bank president, large bank, on these other-directed questions.

With respect to Hypothesis # 2 relating to Fromm's marketing orientation, the null hypothesis is accepted. However, two of the twelve questions showed significant differences: questions 15 and 56; thus, the bank president, large bank, ranks more (higher) than the bank president, small bank, on these marketing oriented questions.

With respect to Hypothesis # 3 relating to Morris' Ways to Live # 5, 8, and 13, the null hypothesis is rejected. A new alternative hypothesis is suggested: the bank president, large bank, ranks less (lower) on Morris' Ways # 8 and 13 than the bank president, amall bank, since two of the three questions showed significant differences: questions # 36 and 41 (Ways 8 and 13).

With respect to Hypothesis # 4 relating to Morris <u>Mays to Live</u> # 4 and 8, the null hypothesis is rejected. A new alternative hypothesis is suggested: the bank president, large bank, ranks less (lower) on Morris' Ways #4 and 8 than the bank president, small bank, since both questions showed significant differences: questions # 32 and 36 (Ways 4 and 8).

With respect to Eypothesis # 5 relating to Riesman's innerdirected social character, the null hypothesis is accepted. However, four of the ten questions showed significant differences: questions 5, 42, 44 and 48. The bank president, large bank, ranks more (higher) than the bank president, small bank, on two inner-directed questions: # 5 and 48; the bank president, small bank, ranks more (higher) than the bank president, large bank, on two inner-directed questions:



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42 and 44.

With respect to Hypothesis # 6 relating to From's hoarding orientation, the null hypothesis is rejected. The alternative hypothesis is accepted: the bank president, small bank, ranks more (higher) than the bank president, large bank, on these hoarding oriented questions showing significant differences: questions # 14, 17, 23, 26, 55, and 64.

With respect to Eypothesis # 7 relating to Morris' <u>Ways to</u> <u>Live</u> # 2, 6, and 12, the null hypothesis is accepted. The bank president, small bank, ranks more (higher) on Morris' Ways # 12 than the bank president, large bank, since one of the three questions showed a significant difference: question # 40 (Way 12).

With respect to Hypothesis # 8 relating to Morris' <u>Ways to Live</u> # 1 and 10, the null hypothesis is rejected. The alternative hypothesis is accepted: the bank president, small bank, ranks more (higher) on Morris' Way #10 than the bank president, large bank, since one of the two questions showed a significant difference: question # 38 (Way 10).

For the sample subjects in this typological study, Morris' <u>Mays to Live</u> provide the greater contribution to self-concept insight. Of the hypothesized total of nine <u>Mays to Live</u>, five showed significant differences.

In addition, it is with Fromm's hoarding orientation that a clear insight to self-concept is provided. Of the hypothesized total of twelve hoarding orientation questions, six showed significant differences.



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Biesman's social character ideal types contribute some insight to self-concept understanding when compared to Fromm and Morris; however, Riesman's typology provides the least of the three. The above comments were also based on noting significant differences with respect to individual criteria questions from each typology. The partial correlation model (Kendall Tau)--Riesman, Froms, Morris, pointed out in an almost identical manner that Morris contributes the most, Fromm provides some insight, and Riesman contributes the least with respect to self-concept insight. In conclusion, the use of Morris' Mays to Live is suggested as the principal framework to approach a greater understanding of self-concept.
