COMMENTARY ON THE BOOK "THE ART OF BEING".

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Erich Fromm The Art of Being Foreword by Rainer Funk Continuum-New York. 1992.

I

When E. Fromm left Mexico in 1973, he had left behind two types of teachings: The direct one, wich he transmitted with his daily fellowship with colleagues and pupils by his way of acting, by personal comments and by his systematic habits wich he maintained in the seminaries and in the cultural life of the university in wich he participated, a teaching transmitted as spoken history -oral tradition- and also the teaching which issues from the books he wrote during his 25 years stay in the country which must be taken as the official, the academic one. Of the pragmatic teachings, which expose him to be the object of understanding and interpretation, since they are due to that systematization of his relationship with a group near to him. there exist testimonials, such as narrations and critiques (' Millan 1980.), texts produced by people he analyzed and with whom he worked in social research.

Those of us who knew him in both circumstances can understand Fromm in two ways, for wich reason it is not strange that the text now brought together and published by Rainer Funk make one think of a personal, intimate, persistent, self-made Fromm, who shows himself to be modestly trying to carry on the difficult art of living his life and a Fromm who is a proffound connoisseur and synthesizer of two great thinkers who influenced a part of his life. The interesting thing about this text was that Fromm himself rejected the very rich personal part, an autobiographical account of his last years, for inclussion in the edittion of "To Have or to Be?" (FROMM 1976 2), a part wich, even at that time, would have shown him in more personal, more intimate light, but wich he preferred to eliminate in favor of academic. These text shows an the apparently dual human condition in Fromm; What he was like intimately and what he showed outwardly. In all this we see a constant struggle to grow, to learn to live and dedicate himself totally to this Task-Steps toward Being- and we also see an intense work of intellectual creativity, Freudian-Marxist synthesis. The book wich has just published is a sampling of been these characteristics of Fromm's.

In chapters II to IV, wich R. Funk rightly emphasizes as Steps toward Being, we find him being the pupil of people more inmersed in the processes of concentration, meditation, physical exercises or practices, aspects permitting the amplification of sensitivity, which prove to be fundamental for Westerners philosophical interested in oriental practice and conceptualization, an apprenticeship which Fromm began at the age of 54. He was the pupil of Charlotte Selver, precticed the art of movement with Katya Delakowa and was with Zbynek Fiser in Buddhism and followed Nyanaponika Mahathera in deep meditation. These were teachers who, each in his own way, permitted an amplification of the consciousness and facilitated concentration. In 1957, he had a meeting with D.T. Susuki in Cuernavaca Morelos, an understanding of Zen-Buddhism and the book wich for the Seminary published $(^{\delta})$ tells of the differences between oriental western thought and of the possibility of coming together and thanks to the concept of psychoanalysis, so that the conjunction with oriental thought migth come throught the unconsciouns.

The Art of Being shows us a Fromm who at the 74 age of confesses his practices of recent years, relaxation and meditation. This is sufficient to consider it an autobiografical text, after "Beyond the Chains of Illusion" (1962). He tells us about his personal activity, his self-discipline and shows us a dilligent an valorous effort to achieve change in himself, to be self-made. Fromm did not simply contemplance his destiny in the last years. After penetrating the unconscious, he attempts to understand existence, his existence. through the practice of oriental meditation and, in his self-analysis, he integrates both Eastern and Western currents. In this, whithout doubt, his attitude is the opposite of S. Freud's, who would keep his last "Die Zukunft einer Illusion" (1927), years for contemplation: when faced with his own destiny, as in the Greek tragedies, which motivated many of his writings and which tinge Western thought. This dramatic influence was played out by Anna Freud herself, when, between the years 1930 to 1935, as told to Esther Menaker (1989), in order to live out her Jewish identity, she had to accept the circunstances and stay in Vienna, dispite the the barbarism already running wild in streets, in blind expectation, an attitude which alarmed Menaker herself, which she, nevertheless, displaces in her feelings and mind whith the knowledge that she is an "American".

The autobiographical text shows us a Fromm struggling whith his inmediate destiny and applying his own analytic knowledge and that derived from his exercises and meditation to the extreme that, if necessary, there will be breaks with his own past, as when he breaks with the term "Humanistic Psychoanalysis" (p 64), wich he had proposed and which would mark him as different from S.Freud in analytical practice. He makes this brake to avoid the inmediate destiny, which would have considered him a mythical

and, he does not wish to be an at the same time, teacher accomplice in the standarization of his own tasks and refuses to contemplate the proposed term being turned to a bureaucratic of the purpose. if it were used as banner a group of psychologists. Although finally Fromm (p 83-84) would not give up his profound belief in human condition and whith a deffinition of the term different from the one he used in the sixties, which limited itself to saying that nothing about you is strange to me, he now proposes, besides, the possibility of transcending us and in this way shows himself.

This book in not only important from an anecdotal point of view, so I should like to bring out three technical evaluations.

A) In the clinical Seminaries of Cuernavaca between 1970 an 1973, Fromm told of his surprise at the assessment given by his orthodox analyst, Dr. Hans Shachs(⁵), about how he hung his coat in a little vestibule before a session, calling this beside his transference". Now it is known throught psychoanalytic "positive (⁶), literature that there existed a current to assess circumstances, like hanging clothing on clothes racks, acts morover very common in Europe, and that these were treated with extreme orthodox point of view in Berlin as well in Vienna, an and considerad a positive transference. This cliché concerning besides being conventional transference, and anti-analytic is very far from the proposal made by Fromm in the text (pag 60-61) to the phenomenon of transference in a deep dimension, referring where we face the dilemma of freedom. We encourage our own growth we face life's alternatives of being oneself, when the one and the author, or when we prefer slavery, wasting responsible our faculties and alienating ourselves into the service Of longing that it will solve the problems of our another OWN existence. In analysis, the therapist bears this responsability alienated he encourages the dependency. and when This is а which Fromm sustained throughout his works and thesis, morover, which is fundamental pillar of this book, besides continuing to interest Fromm to the end.

B) A second point is cleary what he proposes as Self-Analysis. Besides the knowledge of the unconscious via psychoanalysis, the amplification of consciousness was complemented with meditation He denies setting himself up as the guide, refuses to exercises. claim that his way must also be the way for the other. It is understood that this is refusal to indicate what it must be for everyone, since the way for each will always be each owns. With his example, we see a searcher for his own well being, through self-development, the practice of various disciplines and with the intention of amplifying the field of consciousness, which in

his greatest attempt becomes his self-analysis, the Self-Analysis. A little before, in 1971, he wrote to Martin Jay (')that people migth be saved more through religious practices or procedures coming of their own efforts than by the socio-economic conditions of modern society and that the latter, on the contrary, does not offer any other way but the formation of the alienated man, which is why he was considered a moralist.

The third point is rather the reopening of a theoretical C) issue. The way he has followed in psychoanalysis, the duality wich began with Eros-Thanatos, which Fromm himself converted into the struggle between Biophilia-Necrophilia and wich he NOW reaffirms for us as To Be-To Have. A social historical analogy would say: In the age of Eros an Thanatos, the social conflict was due the blindness of sexual repression; in the age of Biophilia-Necrophilia, society was emerging from its necrophilious feast, a product of the wars. At the present time, after God has died and spirituality has been lost, even by the religious leaders, material profits take relevance, while a neoliberal solution and a free market do not precisely strengthen the spirit.

The Text which has now been published was necessary and we hope the other published in German by Rainer Funk will soon be available to readers in America. These are works of a brilliant. profound and humanistic thinker but at the same time no less readable.
