"Re libido has the task of making the destroying instinct unconscious and it fulfills the task by directing that instinct to a great extent outside, soon with the help of a non-sensual organic system, the muscular apparatus - towards objects in the external world. Re instinct is then called the destructive instinct, the instinct for mastery or the will to power. A portion of the instinct is placed directly in the service of the sexual function, where it has an important part to play. This is sadism proper. Another portion does not share this transposition onwards, it remains inside the organism, and with the help of the accompanying penile excitation described above, becomes libidinally bound there. It is in this portion that we have to recognize the original, erogenous masochism." (Ego Inst., p. 163-4)

Pleasurable tension.
"It seems that in the series of feelings of tension we have a direct sense of the increase and decrease of the amount of stimulus, and it can not be doubted that there are pleasurable tensions and unpleasant relations of tensions.
