Continuous Lithiation Reaction Set-up



Flexible Intensified Continuous Plant



- Fast and complex exothermic reaction
- Hazardous and inflammable substances
 → Explosion protection!
- Prone to fouling & clogging
- Multi-objective constrained optimization

Indirect Hard Modeling (IHM)



Modeling peak fitting of pure component spectra \rightarrow mixture model Analysis "component fitting" \rightarrow calculation of component area



IHM – "Model Building"



Assignment of NMR Signals to Pure Components



IHM – "Component Fitting" BAM Interpretation of Experimental Data with Pure Components
