A Big library that started from small

- In 1640 a gymnasium in Turku was turned into the Royal Academy of Turku. The book collection of the gymnasium, about 20 volumes, served as the starting point for the Library of the Royal Academy of Turku.
- Since 1707, legislation has ordered the printing houses to provide one copy of each publication to our library. Similar legislation has prevailed through the times of being part of different reigning states.






Library relocated to Helsinki

- In 1828, the University was moved to Helsinki.
- In 1845, the Library moved into it's current main building.
- In 2006, the name of the library was changed to the National Library of Finland.
- Nowadays we're an Independent institute at the Helsinki University.

The Collections in the National Library of Finland

National collection, called Fennica

- Based on the legal deposit material, i.e. all publications in Finland
- Books, magazines, newspapers, games, records
- Includes The Finnish National Sound archive
- In addition to that, we have a lot of ephemera, paper archives, Finnish web archive, digital collections etc. All of them are not catalogued into Koha.





Other collections present in Koha

- Special collections
 - Oldest deposit copies and other old materials
- The Slavonic collection
 - Roots back to the deposit copies at the 19th century, in various languages
 - Serving research related to Eastern European and Russian studies
- The Humanities collection
 - Research literature in various languages
 - Concentrates on history, art studies, literature and philosophy



Huge Koha database

- The National Library of Finland has maybe one of the biggest Koha databases
 - 3 398 000 bibliographic records
 - 2 330 000 holdings records
 - 2 351 000 items







How we use Koha

Some statistics:

- Approximately 10 000 customers have our library card (at May /2024)
 - Customers are mostly researchers and students, but we're open to anyone who needs our collections
- 27 000 loans / year
- 306 000 renewals / year
- Over 120 librarians with Koha accounts





Homeloans and reading room loans

- Most of our collections are located in closed storages.
 - Customers can place the holds themselves, through our Finna OPAC <u>https://kansalliskirjasto.finna.fi/</u>
- We have a lot of material that we don't lend outside the library.
- Even though we're just a one library, we have different "branches" in Koha, to represent our different reading rooms and lending spots.







Koha as a part of our library system infrastructure

In addition to Koha, we also use other library systems to manage our services.



Melinda

- Melinda database, using Aleph.Cataloguing in collaboration with other libraries in Finland.

- Holding records
- Items
- Reports
- Acquisitions






Finna

- Serves as OPAC for our customers.
- Our data visible both in our own kansalliskirjasto.finna.fi and finna.fi, covering most Finnish libraries + many museums and archives.



Koha in Finnish scientific libraries

- The Koha Consortium of the Finnish scientific libraries is an open consortium of 17 libraries that use Koha.
- Priorities are decided together.
- Library collections were converted to Koha during years 2018-2019.
- Regular meetings between main users and between library managers.





Koha in Finnish scientific libraries (technical perspective)

- Finna is used as an OPAC no work for Koha's own OPAC.
- The National Library of Finland provides software development and maintenance services.
 - Small fixes can be done swiftly
 - Our code goes to Koha main version, too.
- CSC (IT Centre for Science) provides server platform services.
- Integrations, for example a student app in some of our libraries is integrated to Koha.



Koha is popular in Finnish public libraries

- Koha has become quite a popular library system among Finnish public libraries.
- Koha-provider for them is a company called Koha-Suomi (Koha-Finland)
 - owned by over 100 participating municipalities.
 - Founded in 2016
- Often the public libraries work in collaboration with other nearby cities / municipalities in library consortiums.



Koha-libraries from south to north

- Public libraries from Hanko to Utsjoki use Koha
 - See <u>https://koha-suomi.fi/</u> for a map!
- 9 consortiums total, 1 joining later this year
 - About 1 million citizens live in their area
- Biggest library consortiums in Koha-Finland are Outi-libraries around Oulu and Vaski-libraries around Turku.
 - Vaski: ~ 3,3 million loans / year
 - Outi: ~ 3,1 million loans / year
 - Other consortiums: 0,9-1,6 million loans/year



Finnish Koha community

- Collaboration between scientific and public libraries
 - Regular visiting in each other's meetings
 - Sharing of best practices and tips
 - Translating Koha into Finnish language together
 - Finnish Koha seminar held about every other year
 - Small, warm, welcoming



- Our aim is to be actively participating in international Koha community
 - For example the international Koha convention, KohaCon, was held in Helsinki last year, bundled with PerlCon





Koha has problems, too

- Some slowness in cases of
 - Many holds for same title (around 1000 it's quite slow)
 - Many items for same title (showing many hundreds of items takes time)
- Some local resolutions already made for those
 - For example paging of holds or items
- Holdings records added to Koha by Finnish scientific libraries
 - We aim to get them included into Koha main version as well
- Customizing settings for your own installation is possible, but customizing for individual users is quite difficult.



Open source library system benefits

- Ownership of the system & data
- Predictable costs
- Transparency of possibilities
- Collaboration & community
- Agility
- Ideology & commitment
- International dimensions
