




Average annual rate of change of international migrants, 2000-2013 (percentage)


International migrants by major area, 1999, 2000, 2013


WHO IS A REF








- give access to a broad range of materials and services reflecting all communities and needs;

IFLA/UNESCO Multicultural Library Manifesto Principles

Library and information services in a culturally and linguistically diverse context include both the provision of services to **all types of library users** and the provision of library services specifically targeted to underserved cultural and linguistic groups. Special attention should be paid to groups which are often marginalized in culturally diverse societies: **minorities, asylum seekers and refugees, residents with a temporary residence permit, migrant workers, and indigenous communities.** http://www.ffa.org/node/8976









