





- 3. Our own Information Literacy OER practices (mirror)







- Giving <u>OER advice</u> on the website (Maastricht)




Marketing: events (mainly OEW)

Needed:

- Repositories (plus feedback!)
- Education in e.g. copyright

We can be the good example (and support)



So what services can we offer as a library?

- Build repositories
- Explain copyrights (cc licences)
- Copyright clearance
- Adding/ helping to develop metadata
- Explain about OER (making, use and reuse)
- Helping to find OER
