Authors' Note

Abstract

Amazon is entering the stationary food trade in the US on a large scale. The world's largest online retailer acquires the organic chain Whole Foods Market for around USD 13.6bn. It is by far the largest acquisition in the company's history only followed by its purchase of the video game streaming platform Twitch and the online pharmacy PillPack, each for approximately USD 1 bn. Amazon had put pressure on stationary retailers in recent years and has shown an increasing interest in getting involved in their business. Amazon opened several bookstores and also drives plans for high-tech supermarkets, which can be operated by only few employees. The group has also been expanding in the fresh food trade and the insurance sector for some time.

THEN:

Amazon buys Whole Foods - the news caused a stir in the markets. Whole Foods, once the hipster star of supermarkets, had increasing problems. The entry of the tech giant reversed the downtrend, while shuffling the food industry. Stock market prices expressed a drama. Supermarket giant Kroger fell by eleven percent and market leader Walmart by almost five percent. In one fell swoop, billions of dollars of market capitalization were lost. The purchase of the supermarket chain is a turning point in retail. At the same time, it is also a kind of confession, because with the deal, Amazon says goodbye to its online model. Behind this is the insight that certain goods such as food cannot be sold well over the Internet.

Amazon's interest in stores is not new. The online giant opened a number of bookstores, experimenting with store concepts in Seattle. It all rather resembled an experimentation and learning phase. But the purchase of Whole Foods shows: Amazon CEO Jeff Bezos must have a plan how he wants to redesign the retail industry. There are hints. More technology, fewer queues, more seamless collaboration of digital and analog data. The merger of physical and Internet-based stores begins.

NOW:

Amazon has made only small changes in the Whole Foods stores. It began selling its own electronic equipment such as echo speakers and organic food. In addition, lockers were installed from which customers can pick up orders from Amazon. By and large, Whole Foods stores still look like they did before the acquisition.

However, Amazon has quickly expanded its prime membership to retail outlets known for their high prices. Prime members get discounts for every purchase. Members with an Amazon credit card will even receive a 5% refund when paying.

It is becoming clearer why Amazon bought Whole Foods. For one, it is getting its hands on lots of shopping data, which will come in handy as Amazon expands its online grocery business and private label offerings. As Amazon combines its Prime service and Whole Foods shopping experience, it is getting even more insight into how the same person shops on- and offline. That means a better ability to target ads and promotions than a grocer typically is able to. Because many shoppers still browse groceries online but shop in person, this combination threatens to be particularly powerful.

Through Whole Foods stores, Amazon has renewed efforts to deliver fresh food — a service that has been a struggle for it in the past. Unlike shampoo or paper towels, fresh food can spoil quickly. It is costly and complicated to deliver. It is expensive to store. Those challenges plagued its efforts with prior delivery service -- Amazon Fresh. Whole Foods' stores provide a more cost-effective way to take care of fresh food, while also providing a launching pad to transport those groceries. Shoppers are more likely to order and trust fresh food and meat from a retailer branded Whole Foods than they are from one named Amazon.

But there is one question still not answered: Whole Foods footprint is far smaller than its largest grocery competitors, but is it big enough for Amazon to accomplish all it wants within the grocery space? There is often speculation about Amazon doing another large deal to augment its footprint. Observers note, though, that doing so would thrust Amazon into regulatory scrutiny.

Synopsis

- Amazon.com Inc. acquired Whole Foods Market Inc. (Whole Foods), an Austin-based owner and operator of natural and organic food supermarkets, for USD 42 per share in cash, or a total value of USD 13,561m.
- Originally, in April 2017, Whole Foods announced that it was seeking a buyer for the entire share capital of the company.
- Amazon.com Inc. and Albertsons Cos Inc. were rumoured to be potential bidders.

Rationale

- The addition of Whole Foods takes Amazon's physical presence to a new level as the grocery chain includes more than 460 stores in the United States, Canada, and the United Kingdom.
- Buying Whole Foods also represents a major escalation in Amazon's long-running battle with Walmart, the largest grocery retailer in the United States, which has been struggling to play catch-up in online shopping.
- For Whole Foods, the deal represents a chance to fend off pressure from activist investors frustrated by a sluggish stock price as it has faced fierce competition from Costco, Safeway, and Walmart, which have begun offering organic produce and kitchen staples, forcing Whole Foods to slash prices.

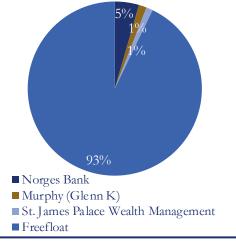

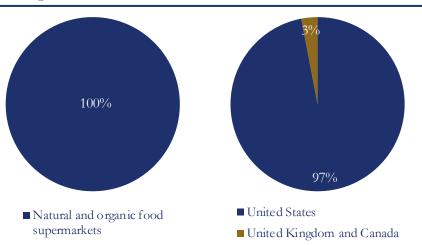
John Mackey CEO Since 2010

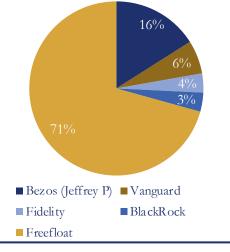
Key Management & Ownership Structure



Jeffery P. Bezos CEO Since 1996

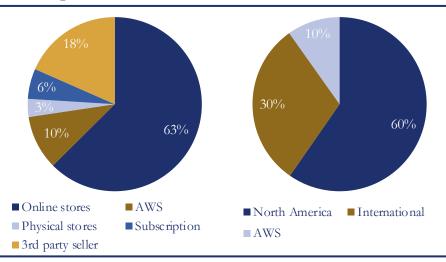


Brian T. Olsavsky CFO Since 2015
