# The Complexity Barrier in REDUCE a Case Study

#### Abstract

The power of the symbolic math system REDUCE for solving large and difficult problems in science and engineering is demonstrated by a set of model problems. These include algebraic equation solving, formal variable elimination, formal power series, symbolic treatment of differential equations and applications from theoretical physics.

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# 1 Introduction

The symbolic math system REDUCE [5] has been developed over the last 30 years. From the beginning, the development of REDUCE has been directed towards the solution of real problems in science and engineering. Originally most applications came from theoretical physics, but it soon became clear that application oriented symbolic computation can be exploited in many scientific and technical disciplines. Consequently the number of applications and specific packages has grown over the years. Nevertheless physics, as well as mechanical and electrical engineering continue to be the main domains of REDUCE.

Some of the currently available symbolic math systems are primarily directed towards use as an extended mathematical note pad, or even as a tool for mathematical education. In contrast to these, REDUCE focuses on the leading edge problem solving aspect and consequently concentrates radically on supplying modern and efficient computation methods and algorithms which are needed to solve large problems.

The intent of this collection of case studies is to demonstrate the specific power of REDUCE for the solution of complicated symbolic computational tasks in science and engineering. These cases mark the leading edge of symbolic methods. Unfortunately this collection cannot represent the power and elegance of the REDUCE algebraic language: most of the advanced problem solutions in the field require extensive algebraic programming where the powerful elementary operations of REDUCE such as polynomial arithmetic, algebraic equation solving etc. are used as black boxes – a well known review of algebraic systems [17] stressed this point by a heading "Power – if you can tame it". Fortunately this aspect is covered by recent books [12, 18, 6].

Last but not least it should be pointed out here that during the 80's and 90's the REDUCE development has grown to a global effort with contributions from many countries in several continents, including a significant European contribution.

The documentation of these packages is found in the REDUCE delivery system or the REDUCE network library.

The computations were performed on a DEC Alpha AXP (OSF-1) machine or on equivalent systems (DEC Alpha AXP PC (Windows NT), HP-Apollo 9000/730 (HP-UX)). For comparison with other systems: these machines perform the REDUCE standard test in about 1.5 seconds<sup>1</sup>.

 $<sup>^{1}</sup>$ A personal computer with an AT architecture and Intel 486 DX2/66 chip needs about 2.6 seconds for the same sequence. When computing with big integers, e.g. for large polynomial computations such as Gröbner bases, the 64 bit DEC AXP processors are significantly faster than a comparable 32 bit machine

## 2 Algebraic equation systems

#### 2.1 Constant quantum Yanq-Baxter equations in 2 dimensions

#### **Problem:**

The the constant quantum Yang-Baxter equation [7, 8]  $R_{j_1j_2}^{k_1k_2}R_{k_1j_3}^{l_1k_3}R_{k_2k_3}^{l_2l_3} = R_{j_2j_3}^{k_2k_3}R_{j_1k_3}^{k_1l_3}R_{k_1k_2}^{l_2l_2}$ leads to a set of 64 quadratic equations in 16 variables

The complete system cannot be solved automatically with fully general unspecified parameters.

## Solution:

J. Hietarinta has broken the problem into smaller parts by symmetry analysis and by exploiting invariants "by hand". This approach leads to a set of specializations of the above matrix, e.g.

$$\left(\begin{array}{ccccc} 1 & b & c & 0 \\ 1-u & m & h & j \\ 1-u & l & m & n \\ 0 & u & u & v \end{array}\right)$$

After substituting these special settings into the full system, a factorizing Gröbner basis can be computed from the resulting system which gives immediate access to the solutions. When the automatic variable sequence optimization of the REDUCE Gröbner package is used, many of these computations are very fast.

The most complicated one starts from

and leads to the factored Gröbner basis

This computation needs 51 seconds. The total evaluation of all 40 subproblems takes 187 seconds.

## 2.2 Elimination of variables

#### **Problem:**

In a context of modeling physical objects using implicit functions, an object is represented as a tri-variate polynomial function F(x, y, z). Further, the surface of the object is taken as the iso-value surface at F(x, y, z) = 0. Find symbolic solution for the locus of points which satisfy the condition F(x, y, z) = 0 and  $\partial F/\partial y = 0$ . Here the functions F are (sparse) polynomials with rational coefficients.

A simple example of one of this type:

 $F = \left(\left(-\frac{1}{4} + x\right)^2 + y^2 + z^2\right)^N + \left(\left(16 * x^2 + 16 * y^2 + \left(\frac{1}{4}\right) * z^2\right)\right)^{-N}$ 

This function F represents an object that somewhat resembles an apple which has been cored where the core is off center.

Compute  $\partial F/\partial y$ , then eliminate the y variable from F and  $\partial F/\partial y$ . For N = 1, we obtain the following factored result:

This represents the solution locus of F = 0 and  $\partial F / \partial y = 0$ .

The problem is easily solved with most computer algebra systems for N = 1 and N = 2 using Gröbner Basis and up to N = 4 using resultants. One key point is one must factor (if possible) the functions before variable elimination.

#### Solution:

The Gröbner package of REDUCE implements a special term order for groupwise variable elimination, where two groups of variables compete. A Gröbner basis computed under this odering has the elimination property [2] with respect to the first variable group, but the complexity of the computation is significantly lower than a full lexicographical Gröbner basis, which is normally used for variable elimination. In the above case the first group has only one element  $\{y\}$  and the second group is  $\{x, z\}$ , such that the "lower" part of a Gröbner basis under this term ordering is free of y and describes exactly the intersection of the polynomial ideal with  $\mathbf{Z}(x, z)$ .

The case N = 16 did not terminate within 12 hours.

Remarks:

- 1. The less factors F has, the higher is the degree of the Gröbner problem and the more time is needed.
- 2. REDUCE is also able to compute the elimination by resultants; however, the approach using Gröbner basis with the special elimination term order is significantly faster.

#### 2.3 Steady state of Lotka-Volterra equation

## **Problem:**

The following algebraic equation system has been derived [14] as steady state solution of a Lotka-Volterra equation describing a neural network. The system has n variables  $x_i$  and one free parameter c.

$$\left\{ 0 = f_j = 1 - x_j * (c + \sum_{i \neq j} x_i^2), \ j = 1 \cdots n \right\}$$

#### Solution:

The system can easily be solved in full generality for  $n \leq 3$ . For n = 4 the system is too complicated for an automatic solution. We therefore decompose the polynomial ideal over  $Z[c][x_1, x_2, x_4, x_4]$  first by a factoring **Gröbner** basis computation with total degree term order. The resulting partial ideals are simple enough for an automatic processing by the REDUCE solve operator.

Remark: Some of the polynomials inside the *root\_of* expressions above have zeros which can be expressed explicitly by surds<sup>3</sup>. However these are too big for practical use.

The total computing time is 9 hours 25 minutes.

 $<sup>^{3}</sup>$ REDUCE returns explicit forms for the roots only if these are "small" or if the user asks for them explicity.

# 3 Series expansions

#### 3.1 Verification of a finite difference formula

#### **Problem:**

Given the partial differential expression

$$DD = \partial_x \Big( a(x,y) \partial_x g(x,y) \partial_y g(x,y) \partial_y f(x,y) \Big) + \partial_y \Big( a(x,y) \partial_x g(x,y) \partial_y g(x,y) \partial_x f(x,y) \Big)$$

and a formula FD = FD(a, f, g, x, y, dx, dy) which is an arithmetic combination of x, y, dx, dy and of function expressions of a, f and g with arguments from x, y, x + dx and y + dy. FD is claimed to be a second order finite difference approximation for the differential equation DD = 0. Check automatically whether this is true.

#### Solution:

Using the packages **DFPART** and **TAYLOR** we introduce the generic function symbols a(x, y), f(x, y) and g(x, y) and declare their partial derivatives commutative. Then we compute in terms of the symbolic partial derivatives of a, f and g

- 1. the fully expanded formula for DD
- 2. the second order Taylor approximation of FD in dx and dy at the point (dx, dy) = (0, 0).

The claim is true if both forms are identical up to an error term of magnitude  $O(dx^2) + O(dy^2)$ .

And indeed both computations lead to the same result

such that their difference vanishes.

with final result 0. The total evaluation takes 8 seconds. The computing time is almost totally spent in the two dimensional Taylor approximation. The computation of an approximation in the next higher degree in dx and dy takes 34 seconds; that result has 379 terms.

## 3.2 Program generation

#### **Problem:**

Generate a reasonable program for the numeric evaluation of the finite difference form fd in the previous example.

#### Solution:

The formula fd had been given in a fully expanded form. This form is inadequate for a direct numeric evaluation for example in a program in the language **C**, because function evaluations with the same arguments are repeated many times. The packages **GENTRAN** and **SCOPE** allow us to convert such an expanded expression (–sequence) into an optimized program source in some target language. For fd we receive the following **C** program: <sup>4</sup>.

## 3.3 Expansion of elliptic functions

#### **Problem:**

Given the differentiation rules and values at x = 0 for the elliptic functions  $\operatorname{sn}(x, k)$ ,  $\operatorname{cn}(x, k)$ ,  $\operatorname{dn}(x, k)$ , expand sn and cn with respect to k about 0 to sixth order and show that (in this order) [1]

 $sn(x,k)^2 + cn(x,k)^2 = 1$ 

Definitions [11]:

- Jacobi's elliptic functions sn(x, k), cn(x, k), dn(x, k). The modulus and complementary modulus are denoted by K and K!', usually written as k and k' respectively.
- epsilon(x, k) is the incomplete elliptic integral of the second kind usually written as E(x|k).
- KK(k) is the complete elliptic integral of the first kind usually written as K(k) (note:  $K(k)=\arcsin(1,k)$ ).
- KK!'(k) is the complementary complete integral usually written mathematically as K'(k) (note: K'(k) = K(k')).
- EE(k) is the complete elliptic integral of the second kind usually written as E(k).
- EE!'(k) is the complementary complete integral usually written as E'(k) (note: E'(k)=E(k')).

# 4 Differential equations

## 4.1 Solving of killing equations

The equations have been generated by the computer algebra system cLaSSI/ShEEp for general relativity which can be coupled directly with REDUCE. The equations are solved by the REDUCE package CRACK.

## 4.2 Symmetry analysis of a PDE system

## **Problem:**

Analyze the symmetries of the Karpman equations [10] which play a role in plasma physics. In their real form they are [3]

#### Solution:

Using the package CRACK. At first, preliminary symmetry conditions are derived and solved successively for each of the three equations. The solution of the preliminary conditions for the first equation requires 31 integrations and states that all  $\xi^i$  are functions of t, x, y, z only. The preliminary conditions of the second equation do not provide new constraints. The result from the preliminary conditions for the third equation is that  $\nu$  is a function of t, x, y, z only. This needs 4 integrations. The full conditions for the first equation are derived which requires a further 77 integrations to solve. The remaining full conditions used to solve the second equation requires 6 integrations. Finally, the full conditions for the last equation are solved with three more integrations.

The general solution for the symmetry generators then reads

# 5 Theoretical physics applications

## 5.1 Non-commutative Algebra

#### **Problem:**

Define a calculus fo a non-commutative algebra based on a system of axioms [6]: Consider, in Cartesian coordinates, the position and the momentum operators  $x_i$  and  $p_i$  of a quantum mechanical system with  $x^2 = x_1^2 + x_2^2 + x_3^2$  and  $p^2 = p_1^2 + p_2^2 + p_3^2$ ; define the commutators  $[x_i, p_j] = i\bar{h}\delta_{ij}$ . Calculate  $[x^2, p_j]$  and  $[x_i, p^2]$ .

## 5.2 Solution of Einstein's field equation

## **Problem:**

Check whether a specific metric of Robinson–Trautman type is a solution of Einstein's field equations of general relativity theory [16, 9].

## Solution:

The following program has been written by J. Dermott McCrea (Dublin)<sup>5</sup> In the first part of the program a general metric with two covariant indices (gdd = g-down-down) is introduced. In terms of gdd, the contravariant metric (guu = g-up-up), the Christoffel symbols (chrisddd, chrisddu), and the Ricci tensor (riccidd) are determined. Moreover, the 22-component of the left hand side of Einstein's field equations with cosmological constant is calculated. In the second part the explicit form of the covariant components of the metric is given and information provided on some functions and their derivatives. As a result of the program, the tensor component lamric22 should turn out to be zero. The REDUCE package EXCALC is used.

The final result is a polynomial of degree 40 in r and u which is too big to be printed here. The computing time is 6 hours 30 minutes.

## 5.3 Computing symmetries of a field equation

## **Problem:**

Check the symmetries of a field equation for the axial vector component of the torsion in a vacuum within an unusual unified theory of gravitational and hadronic interactions (see [4] for details). The equations are

$$\Delta K - \frac{d\delta K}{2} + *(K^d K) = 0$$

where K is a 1-form, d is the exterior derivative, \* is the Hodge dual operator, and  $\delta$  is the adjoint of d under \*. It is well known that the first two terms are invariant under the conformal group of transformations: the question is whether the third, non-linear term spoils this invariance.

#### Solution:

Use the package **EXCALC** to convert the equation from the simple geometrical form above into (messy) component equations. Then change the notation (PARTDF  $\rightarrow$  DF) before giving the equations to **CRACK** with the most general linear symmetry ansatz. The computation shows that the conformal invariance is preserved. A similar calculation without the constraining ansatz eventually produces the same set of symmetries.
